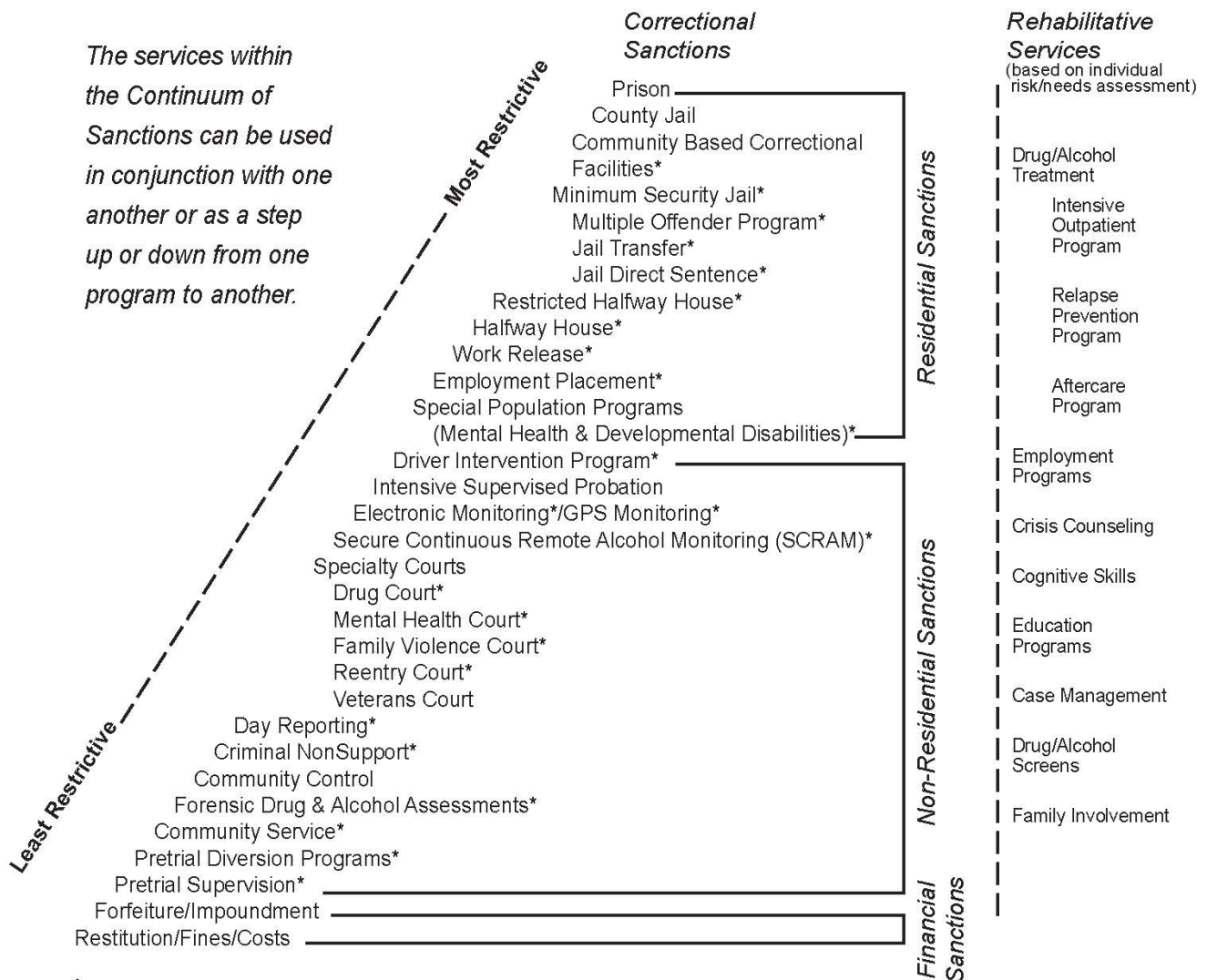

PROGRAM GOAL

- To provide a cost effective and humane point of entry to comprehensive services for Summit County residents determined to be under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs.

DETOXIFICATION

TARGET POPULATION

- Adult Summit County residents who are intoxicated and/or experiencing withdrawal symptoms.

SCREENING PROCESS

- Clients may be self-referred, referred by family or friends, physicians, community agencies, police, court personnel, or probation and parole officers.
- Admission to Sub-acute (inpatient) detox is based on the result of a nursing assessment that suggests an applicant for admission is experiencing or is expected to experience acute withdrawal symptoms.
- Acceptance to Ambulatory (outpatient) Detox is based on the result of a nursing assessment and physical exam and may be an option for those with a supportive home environment who are able to return daily to the ADM Crisis Center to receive medications and individual and group counseling support for a period of three to five days.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Detoxification services will be available to appropriate clients without restriction.
- Appropriate medical support is provided by a physician and access to 24-hour nursing coverage during the detoxification period.
- Individual and group counseling are available.
- An assessment of Substance Use Disorder(s) is done on all clients.
- Recovery Coaches: these volunteers are trained to serve as personal guides and mentors for people seeking or in recovery.
- Family Programming is designed to educate, support, and promote family relationships and healing.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATION

- Cost is based on a sliding scale in lieu of Medicaid coverage.

SUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Clients will be considered successfully released from the Detoxification Unit if they have completed the medical regimen.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- If an individual in sub-acute leaves the Unit before completing both the medical regimen and alcohol and drug assessment it will be considered an unsuccessful discharge.
- If an individual in ambulatory detox fails to return daily to the ADM Crisis Center prior to release from the program, it is considered an unsuccessful discharge.

DROP-IN CENTER

PROGRAM GOAL

- To provide a safe environment for individuals who need to recuperate from the acute effects of alcohol and/or drugs.

TARGET POPULATION

- Adult Summit County residents who are self-referred, brought to the facility by local law enforcement agencies, or referred by community agencies.

SCREENING PROCESS

- Appropriateness for services is based on staff evaluation of the client's needs.

DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES

- Clients may remain in the Drop-In Center until they are no longer under the effects of the drugs and/or alcohol.
- Based on each client's needs, showers, laundry and meals are available.
- Observation and monitoring for withdrawal symptoms and other medical problems.
- Assessment and referral services are available to willing participants.
- Recovery Coaches: these volunteers are trained to serve as personal guides and mentors for people seeking or in recovery.
- Family Programming is designed to educate, support, and promote family relationships and healing.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATION

- There is no cost for this program.

SUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Clients will be considered successfully released if they have a negative alco-sensor test and/or have been medically cleared by medical staff.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- If clients leave the facility while intoxicated or under the influence it will be considered leaving against staff advice.

Oriana House, Inc. provides the alcohol and substance abuse treatment services at the ADM Crisis Center through a contract with the Summit County Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health (ADM) Services Board.

INTENSIVE OUTPATIENT PROGRAM (IOP)

PROGRAM GOAL

- To provide an intensive, nonresidential substance abuse treatment program for adults with alcohol or other substance abuse problems.

TARGET POPULATION

- Clients participating in Oriana House programs who are in need of substance abuse treatment or are court ordered to attend Oriana House's treatment program.

SCREENING PROCESS

- Clients are sentenced to an Oriana House program by the court.
- Clients are assessed to determine the nature and extent of their substance abuse, misuse and/or addiction.

DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES

- A six-week, 18-session program.
- Individual and group counseling sessions.
- Conjoint counseling sessions.
- Referrals for urine drug screens and alcohol tests are made as necessary.
- Full, nonresidential treatment allowing participants to maintain home, family, and employment.
- Participation in weekly self-help groups.
- A 6-12-week Aftercare Program consisting of weekly group sessions and individual counseling to help clients practice and integrate newly acquired social skills and relapse prevention skills.
- Recovery Coaches trained to serve as personal mentors for people seeking or in recovery.
- Family Programming designed to educate, support, and promote family healing.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATION

- The program fee is negotiable, based on the client's ability to pay.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- 30 day period of verified sobriety.
- Completion of Individualized Treatment Plan.
- No new criminal charges or re-arrests.
- Evidence of internalizing newly acquired skills through demonstration of prosocial behavior and adherence of overall program rules and policies.
- Regular attendance and participation at all Substance Abuse Treatment Groups.
- Participation in the conjoint and family component.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Failure to achieve a 30 day period of verified sobriety after appropriate treatment extensions.
- Failure to complete objectives of Individualized Treatment Plan.
- New criminal charges and rearrests.
- Failure to participate: If a client refuses to complete the required homework, role plays, and Individualized Treatment Plan client may be discharged from Substance Abuse Treatment.
- Failure to attend treatment groups: if a client fails to attend three treatment groups his treatment episode will be reviewed.

AFTERCARE PROGRAM

PROGRAM GOALS

- To provide continuing support for recovering individuals who have completed a treatment program.
- To maintain and, if possible, enhance the gains made during the initial treatment experience.
- To build a foundation for continued recovery that allows for lifestyle and behavioral changes that support sobriety.
- To continue to practice skills necessary to promote recovery.

TARGET POPULATION

- Individuals who have completed an Oriana House substance abuse treatment program and are committed to their recovery.

SCREENING PROCESS

- Clients are referred by their individual treatment counselor after completing an Oriana House substance abuse treatment program.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Weekly, 90-minute group sessions for six, nine, or 12 weeks based on ORAS score.
- Individual treatment plans developed between the counselor and the client.
- Individual counseling sessions.
- Recovery Coaches trained to serve as personal mentors for people seeking or in recovery.
- Family Programming designed to educate, support, and promote family healing.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATION

- There is no cost to the client for this program.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Conforming to program rules and completing the prescribed course of treatment will result in a successful completion.

PROGRAM GOAL

- To identify, assess, and recommend eligible offenders for substance abuse treatment services, thereby providing the court system a method to divert appropriate offenders to treatment.

TARGET POPULATION

- Court-referred adult, male and female, misdemeanor or traffic offenders in Summit County in need of assessment and treatment for substance abuse services who have been referred by the court system.

SCREENING PROCESS

- Screening process utilizes a standardized screening tool (Substance Abuse Subtle Screening Inventory-3) and an assessment interview to determine eligibility for services.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Substance Abuse assessments (incarcerated and non-incarcerated individuals).
- Case Management (for monitoring of compliance/treatment and coordination of services). Urine drug screens and alcohol tests are required.
- Referrals to appropriate levels of care consistent with standardized placement criteria.
- Timely communication with the Akron and Summit County court systems regarding clients.
- Recovery Coaches trained to serve as personal mentors for people seeking or in recovery.
- Family Programming designed to educate, support, and promote family healing.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATION

- Clients are charged for a substance abuse assessment received in the central assessment department.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Complying with the mandates of the referring court will result in successful completion.

PROGRAM GOAL

- To provide substance use evaluations with treatment recommendations and referrals to clients seeking alcohol and substance abuse treatment services.

TARGET POPULATION

- Adult Summit County residents who are in need of a substance use assessment and referral to treatment services.
- Referrals are initiated by the person seeking services and may be facilitated or encouraged by family, friends, community agencies, probation and parole officers, police, or court personnel.

SCREENING PROCESS

- The screening process consists of an interview and standardized inventory testing to determine eligibility and appropriateness for services.

DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES

- Substance abuse assessment.
- Referrals to appropriate level of care using standardized placement criteria.
- Recovery Coaches trained to serve as personal mentors for people seeking or in recovery.
- Family Programming designed to educate, support, and promote family healing.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATION

- Cost is based on a sliding scale.

DRIVER INTERVENTION PROGRAMS (DIP)

PROGRAM GOALS

- To reduce further incidents of drunk driving by providing substance use screenings, education and treatment referrals.
- To provide a cost-effective sanction for clients who have been convicted of driving under the influence (DUI) of alcohol.

TARGET POPULATION

- First-time male and female DUI clients sentenced to either a mandatory three-day (72-hour) term or a mandatory six-day term as required by Ohio law.

SCREENING PROCESS

- Clients are sentenced to the program by the court.
- Court completes a registration form and sends it to Oriana House's Admissions Department.
- Clients are given approximately two weeks to pay the program fee.
- Upon receipt of payment, clients are scheduled for their incarceration.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Both the three-day (72-hour) and the six-day program begin Thursday at 5:00 p.m. The three-day program ends Sunday at 5:00 p.m. Clients who are required to serve six days are accommodated in this program for the first three days, then transfer to a corrections facility.
- Clients receive alcohol/drug screenings and alcohol and other drug education accomplished through tests, lectures, films, and a one-on-one interview.
- Clients receive 25.5 hours of substance use education and prevention programming.
- Clients assessed to be in need of drug/alcohol treatment are referred to a specific community agency for treatment.
- The courts require clients to follow through on their treatment recommendations.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- Cost of the 72-hour Driver Intervention Program is \$300 and cost of the six-day program is \$420. The cost of the out-of-county, six-day program is \$492.
- Indigent funds are available for those clients who qualify.
- Clients unable to pay the full fee are required to pay a negotiated fee determined by the court.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Individuals not referred for treatment are considered successful upon completion of all program requirements.
- Individuals referred for treatment must complete all program and referral requirements.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Failure to follow through with any referral will result in notification, by letter, to the sentencing court for further action.
- Failure to adhere to program rules may result in dismissal from the program.

GLENWOOD JAIL - DUI MULTIPLE OFFENDER PROGRAM (MOP)

PROGRAM GOALS

- To alleviate jail crowding while providing a comprehensive substance use assessment and treatment program.
- To provide a cost-effective sanction for clients who have been convicted of driving under the influence (DUI) of alcohol.

TARGET POPULATION

- Male and female clients with previous DUI convictions who are sentenced to municipal and county jails.

SCREENING PROCESS

- Clients are sentenced to the program by the court.
- A registration form is completed by the court and sent to Oriana House's Admissions Department.
- Clients are given approximately two weeks to pay the program fee.
- Upon receipt of payment, clients are scheduled for their session.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Operated according to Ohio Minimum Security Jail Standards.
- The program is comprised of three components: completion of a mandatory jail sentence; participation in and completion of a substance abuse treatment program; and participation in and completion of a 60-day aftercare program.
- Substance abuse treatment is a 48-hour, in-house, Ohio Mental Health and Addiction Services–certified, intensive, outpatient program. Treatment includes 16 group counseling sessions of three hours over four weeks, and four individual counseling sessions per treatment episode.
- All clients will begin treatment at the beginning of the first week's session. Clients with sentences of less than 60 days may be scheduled through normal procedures or placed in the program on an accelerated basis as determined by the court and Oriana House's Admissions Department.
- All clients must be available for lab work on the first Saturday of the program.
- Urine drug screens and alcohol tests are required.
- In-house services may include:

- All fees are subject to change.
- Clients sentenced to the Multiple Offender Program by courts outside of Summit County are required to pay an out-of-county fee.
- Clients, referred by a Summit County Court, who are unable to pay the full program fee, are required to pay a negotiated fee as determined by the court.
- Indigent funds are available for those clients who may qualify.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Clients who complete the required incarceration and treatment are successfully discharged.
- Individuals who are incarcerated for 10 days are required to continue to attend the full four-week treatment program in order to receive a successful completion for the program.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Clients who fail to adhere to the correctional or treatment requirements are terminated from the program.

PROGRAM GOALS

- To alleviate municipal and county jail crowding while providing a comprehensive substance use assessment and treatment program.

TARGET POPULATION

- Male and female misdemeanor and felony (F4 and F5) offenders who otherwise might be sentenced to municipal and county jails.
- Eligibility is determined by the Summit County Sheriff's Office standards

SCREENING PROCESS

- Clients are directly sanctioned to the program by the court.
- A registration form is completed by the court and sent to Oriana House's Admissions Department.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Operated according to Ohio Minimum Security Jail Standards.
- The program is comprised of a mandatory jail sentence, a substance use assessment and participation in and completion of a substance abuse treatment program as needed.
- Substance abuse treatment is a 48-hour, in-house, Ohio Mental Health and Addiction Services–certified, intensive, outpatient program. Treatment includes 16 group counseling sessions of three hours over four weeks, and four individual counseling sessions per treatment episode.
- All clients will begin treatment at the beginning of the first week's session. Clients with sentences of less than 60 days may be scheduled through normal procedures or placed in the program on an accelerated basis as determined by the court and Oriana House's Admissions Department.
- Urine drug screens and alcohol tests are required.
- In-house services include:

- There are no programming costs to the client.

- Clients who fail to adhere to the correctional or treatment requirements are terminated from the program.

PROGRAM GOALS

- To divert clients from local jails and prison systems and provide the courts with a direct sentencing option to a community sanction.
- To reduce recidivism using evidence based practices in a highly structured, residential setting.
- To facilitate re-entry into the community by assisting offenders in changing behavior.

TARGET POPULATION

- Adult male and female felony, misdemeanor and traffic offenders and parolees in need of long-term rehabilitative programming.
- Transitional Control clients referred by the Department of Rehabilitation and Correction for a maximum placement of 180 days.
- Federal clients referred by the Bureau of Prisons, federal probation, and pretrial (for Cuyahoga and Summit counties only).

SCREENING PROCESS

- Clients are directly referred from court, probation, the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction, the Federal Bureau of Prisons, and the Adult Parole Authority.
- Clients must be screened by Oriana House's Admissions Department to determine eligibility with the exception of clients in Southeast Ohio who are screened by probation and parole. Admission criteria are determined on a case by case basis.
- Perspective clients are screened and approved by the Oriana House, Inc., Admissions Department based on risk and need.
- Clients should be referred to enter and successfully complete the program.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Programming is assessment driven, evidence based and addresses criminogenic needs.
- Clients' program needs are assessed through standard risk/needs assessments used to develop an individualized program and community plans.
- Length of stay is determined by risk level, areas of need, compliance with programming, and demonstration of learned skills.
- Clients gradually earn privileges and advance through a multi-phase program as they attain their program goals and demonstrate skill acquisition. Frequency of programming and duration of placement are determined by assessment and client performance.
- Urine drug screens and alcohol tests are required.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- When employed, the client pays per diems equaling 20% of gross income.
- Transitional Control clients pay 25% of their gross income.
- Federal clients pay a 25% subsistence fee mandated by the Federal Bureau of Prisons.
- Client must address financial obligations, such as court costs, child support, fines, restitution, and Oriana House incurred expenses.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Clients are required to complete a specified number of days based on risk assessment and/or as determined by the referral source.
- Completion of all program and court requirements and an ability to demonstrate acquired skills.
- Obtain required dosage hours.
- Demonstration of newly acquired skills that facilitate behavior change.
- Satisfied all court requirements.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Failure to adhere to the rules of Oriana House or the referring agency.
- New arrest may result in termination.
- Failure to achieve Individual Program Plan goals and objectives.
- Failure to demonstrate use of new skills.

RESTRICTED HALFWAY HOUSE PROGRAM

PROGRAM GOALS

- To divert clients from local jails and prison systems.
- To provide the courts with a direct sentencing option to a community sanction.

TARGET POPULATION

- Male and female adult felony, misdemeanor, and traffic offenders in need of a restrictive community corrections sanction of 60 days or less.

SCREENING PROCESS

- Clients are sentenced by the court and probation departments.
- Perspective clients are screened and approved by the Oriana House, Inc., Admissions Department.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- All clients are assessed using the Ohio Risk Assessment System (ORAS) during their placement. Additional assessments may be done based on need and length of sentence.
- Case monitoring, including referrals to community resources to address client's program needs.
- Clients are only permitted to leave the facility for medical, psychological, and treatment appointments.
- Clients are required to attend employment class.
- Clients are required to perform community service under staff supervision.
- Regular and random drug and alcohol tests are administered to determine program compliance and substance abuse treatment needs.
- In-house service may include but are not limited to:
 - Assessments: Risk/Need
 - Substance Use
 - Employment
 - Referrals to Community Resources
 - Employment Services
 - Education Services
 - Recovery Coaches
 - Crisis Counseling
 - Recreation
 - Child Support Education/Assistance
 - Life Skills
 - Religious Services
 - 12-Step Programming
 - Family Programming
- Short Term Offender Program (STOP) - Clients in Summit County who are sentenced for 60 days or less will receive the following limited services through the Short Term Offender Program (STOP) component of the halfway house program:
 - Case monitoring
 - Drug/alcohol testing
 - An ORAS Community Supervision Screening Tool (CSST) is completed upon intake to identify needs and direct community planning for client referral upon release.
 - Clients involved in less than 32 hours of employment and/or education per week are required to participate in supervised community services activities.
 - Employed clients are monitored through on-site job checks, phone contacts, and/or payroll records.
 - Approved leave for employment, education, job searches, medical/psychological appointments

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- Clients are required to address financial obligations, such as court costs, child support, fines, restitution, and any outstanding fees owed to Oriana House, Inc.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Compliance with program rules and guidelines within court imposed timeframe.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Failure to adhere to program rules and/or court imposed rules.
- Arrest may result in an unsuccessful completion.

WORK RELEASE/EMPLOYMENT PLACEMENT PROGRAM

PROGRAM GOALS

- To provide medication assisted treatment to opioid dependent clients primarily using Vivitrol®.
- To divert clients from prison.
- To reduce recidivism using evidence based practices in a highly structured and secure community sanction program.
- To facilitate re-entry into the community by assisting offenders in changing behavior.

TARGET POPULATION

- Adult male and female felony offenders residing in Summit County and misdemeanants residing in Summit County arrested by the Akron Police Department; clients must have a diagnosis of opioid dependence in need of long-term rehabilitative programming and voluntarily agree to receive medication assisted treatment, primarily Vivitrol.

- CBCF program placements are confined to the facility upon intake for a minimum of 30 days with the exception of a medical or mental health emergency, which requires a supervised staff transport.
- Clients' program needs are assessed through standard risk/needs assessment used to develop individualized and community plans with an assigned caseworker.
- Clients gradually earn privileges and advance through a multi-phase program as they attain their program goals and demonstrate skill acquisition.
- The overall length of the program is dependent on specific client needs. The residential component may last up to 180 days. The non-residential transitional control phase may last an additional 180 days. All time lines are dependent on specific client needs and court requirements.
- **Phase I Assessment & Confinement**
 - Clients will undergo a chemical dependency assessment (prior to admission); education, employment, and mental health assessments; as well as a medical examination.
 - Specialized screens/assessments such as a Trauma Screen, Anger Assessment, and Criminal Thinking Scale will also be used.
 - Frequency of programming and duration of placement are determined by assessment and client performance. The main focus will be given to the clients' chemical dependency needs with specialized attention to trauma and anger management issues if appropriate.
 - Other programming is assessment driven, evidenced based, and addresses criminogenic needs. Cognitive Programming will also be introduced to the clients during this phase.

- **Phase II Community Involvement**

- Program eligibility will be in conjunction with the individual's risk level of reoffending as determined by the Ohio Risk Assessment System (ORAS).
- Moderate, high, and very high risk males; and low, moderate, and high risk females leaving a CBCF or halfway house who need further programming and case management.
- **Exclusionary Criteria:**
 - Day Reporting – Any client unable to participate in the program.

SCREENING PROCESS

- The referring agency may specify the type of supervision, programming, and program duration.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

 - In-person program participation and reporting is required between 5 and 20 hours per week and as often as 5 days per week.
 - Daily phone calls may be utilized to monitor clients.

- Urine drug screens and alcohol tests are required.
- Electronic Monitoring and Residential Placements are available if closer supervision or an increased level of treatment is needed.
- Payment of restitution and court costs is monitored.
- Programming and services available may include, but not be limited to:
 - Substance Use Treatment
 - Cognitive Skills Programming
 - Child Support Education
 - Family Programming
 - Education Services
 - Recovery Coach Services
 - Anger Management
 - Financial Management Class
 - Employment Services

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- Day Reporting clients are charged \$5 per week or part thereof.
- There is no charge for clients to participate in Transitional Services.
- Clients are required to address financial obligations, such as court costs, child support, fines, restitution, and any outstanding fees owed to Oriana House.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Compliance with reporting requirements and recommended programming goals results in successful completion of the program.
- Demonstrate application of learned skills from assigned programming.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Failure to adhere to reporting requirements.
- Failure to participate in recommended programming.
- Failure to work towards Individual Program Plan goals.
- Conviction of a new offense may result in unsuccessful program completion.

PROGRAM GOAL

- To enable 24-hour monitoring while providing structured support for clients to continue in substance abuse treatment, education, vocational employment and/or mental health counseling.

TARGET POPULATION

- Adult, male and female, felony, misdemeanor, or traffic clients.
- Juveniles referred by Summit County and other Juvenile Courts.
- Pretrial release clients in need of supervision.
- Electronic Monitoring may be utilized for Oriana House clients as a reward for compliance in residential programs, or as a sanction for noncompliance in a nonresidential program, or as a direct court placement.
- **Exclusions:** Individuals with a pacemaker or defibrillator (due to interference with monitoring equipment).

SCREENING PROCESS

- Oriana House clients are referred to the Electronic Monitoring Program through the court, probation, parole, internal transfers, or emergency release from the County Jail.
- Clients must have a permanent residence, electricity and phone service (digital phone service is permitted). Special arrangements can be made for clients without landline phone service.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Utilizes an active, tamper-proof, electronic monitoring system approved by the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigations.
- Provides 24-hour monitoring, seven days a week, 365 days a year.
- Primary programming is assessment driven, evidence based, and addresses criminogenic needs.
- Requires random and weekly urine drug screens and alcohol testing.
- Requires in-person reporting, based on risk/need assessment. Length of meetings will depend on need of client.
- Requires verification of all activities outside the residence. Employment must be verified by time card and/or paystub.
- Monitoring of all treatment appointments and weekly attendance at Alcoholics Anonymous, support groups, individual counseling, and doctor's appointments.
- Installation of monitoring equipment for adults is provided at the Electronic Monitoring office in Summit County and at local courts in the Seneca County, Erie County, and other areas; juveniles report to the Summit County Juvenile Court Detention Center for installation or to the Electronic Monitoring office in Summit County.
- Random job checks are conducted by phone.
- Referral agency involvement is maintained by means of monthly progress reports, discharge reports, and notification of program violations.
- Referral agency is provided with copy of positive urine screens.
- Global Positioning Satellite Monitoring (GPS) is also available. There are three levels of GPS Monitoring available: Active, Intermediate, and Passive. For an Active GPS referral the referring agency needs to provide a 24/7 contact person of authority to respond to violation.

- Services available by referral, may include:
 - Case Management – EPICS focused
 - Substance Use Assessment
 - Substance Abuse Treatment
 - Substance Abuse Aftercare
 - Relapse Prevention
 - Recovery Coaches
 - Family Programming
 - Education Services
 - Employment Services
 - Cognitive Skills Program
 - Community Service
 - Limited Case Management for clients referred by Summit County Juvenile Court

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- Client will address financial obligations, such as court costs, child support, fines and restitution.
- Seneca County: Clients pay a \$25 installation fee and provide payment for the first week of per diems at time of installation. Per diems are determined by referral type.
- Erie County: The court is billed for client per diems unless they require client to self-pay.
- Summit County: A refundable deposit of \$50 for adults and \$25 for juveniles is required for all types of electronic monitoring equipment; however there is no deposit fee for APA or Federal referrals. Per diems are based on a sliding fee scale for adults; Summit County Juvenile Court is billed for juvenile per diems. Out of county referrals pay an additional \$50 installation fee and a minimum of \$7 per day (this fee could be higher based on the client's gross income.)
- Stark County: Stark County clients are paid for by the court unless otherwise indicated.
- For all other courts, fees will be determined based on contractual agreement.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Compliance with program conditions, positive program participation, completion of required programming and adherence to prescribed time-schedule result in successful completion.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Failure to adhere to the Oriana House rules of the referring agency or Oriana House results in unsuccessful completion.
- Tampering with equipment may result in termination from the program.

PROGRAM GOAL

- To enable the courts, probation staff, and treatment providers to monitor clients on a 24-hour basis to determine their use of alcohol.

TARGET POPULATION

- Adult and juvenile male and female offenders who have been convicted of multiple DUI violations and are seeking driving privileges or who need 24-hour alcohol monitoring.
- Persons arrested for alcohol related offenses that the court makes abstinence from alcohol a condition of bond.
- Persons engaged in substance abuse treatment who have demonstrated an inability to refrain from the use of alcohol during treatment.
- Offenders under supervision who have demonstrated an inability to remain alcohol free.
- For clients referred to the North Central Ohio program, the program shall be a minimum of 30 days and a maximum set by the court; for clients referred to the Summit County program, the program shall be a minimum of 45 days and a maximum set by the court.
- For persons requiring monitored visitation from Domestic Relations court.

SCREENING PROCESS

- The court, probation officer, or treatment provider determines the need for 24-hour alcohol monitoring for each client based on the need for monitoring and the client's need for abstinence.
- In Summit County, a referral is made by calling Oriana House's Admissions Department at (330) 535-8116.
- In North Central Ohio, a referral is made by calling the non-residential case manager at (567) 220-7018, ext. 4201.
- In Southeast Ohio, a referral is made by calling (330) 374-9425.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Utilizes an alcohol-monitoring device that measures a person's Transdermal Alcohol Concentration™ (TAC). The system is known as Secure Continuous Remote Alcohol Monitor or SCRAM.
- The client will wear a tamper-resistant ankle bracelet that resembles a typical electronic monitoring device. This device measures the client's perspiration for the presence of alcohol that is excreted through the skin.
- The SCRAM bracelet communicates with a modem that is connected to the client's landline phone. The modem transmits the data to a host computer that records all tests and tamper information. Clients without landline phone service may be required to report to the facility at a minimum of two times a week to download the SCRAM bracelet.
- Oriana House staff receives the information from the host computer on a regular basis with "alerts" being processed daily and violations reported to the referring agency.
- Clients will report in person to Oriana House for a check of their equipment within the first week of enrolling and every two weeks thereafter, or as needed. Urine drug screens will be conducted randomly and or as ordered by the court up to twice per month. Clients must pay their fees in advance at the time of reporting.
- Case Management services will be limited to supervising the client to assure compliance with program rules and communications with the referring agency.

- Remote breath alcohol monitoring is also available. A hand-held cellular device utilizes facial recognition for identity verification and provides a GPS location of where the client is while testing.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- For clients referred to the Summit County program: The client is responsible for a \$50 refundable equipment deposit, a \$75 installation fee and daily monitoring fee. The daily fee for all services will be based on the client's gross weekly income up to a maximum of \$13 per day. All referrals from non-contracting jurisdictions will pay a daily fee of \$13 per day. Clients referred from courts that contract for services may pay according to a sliding scale as approved in the contract. Clients referred from non-contracting jurisdictions will be required to pay for the entire costs of the program.
- SCRAM Visitation Program (Summit County only): Clients are responsible for a one-time installation fee of \$100 and \$15 for every day they wear the bracelet or have a remote breath device.
- For clients referred to the North Central Ohio program: The client is responsible for a \$25 installation fee and daily monitoring fee. The daily fee for all services will be based on the client's gross weekly income up to a maximum of \$13 per day. All referrals from non-contracting jurisdictions will pay a daily fee of \$13 per day. Clients referred from courts that contract for services may pay according to a sliding scale as approved in the contract. Clients referred from non-contracting jurisdictions will be required to pay for the entire costs of the program.
- For clients referred to Southeast Ohio program: Call 330-374-9425 for financial information.
- All fees must be paid in advance. The installation fee, deposit, and the first week's per-day fee will be paid upon installation. The per-day fee for the remainder of the program will be collected in advance during the course of the program.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Abstinence from alcohol throughout the duration of the monitoring period will result in successful program completion. It can be expected that not all clients will remain alcohol free for the entire period of monitoring. Clients who experience some adjustment issues should become and remain alcohol free within the first few weeks of the program.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Failure to remain alcohol free may result in termination or referral to the supervising agency for further sanctions.
- Tampering with equipment may result in termination or referral to the supervising agency for further sanctions.

PROGRAM GOAL

- To provide supervision of defendants.
- To assure compliance with the conditions of release from jail and bond requirements as imposed by a judicial officer.

TARGET POPULATION

- Defendants who have been booked into the Summit County Jail due to a felony arrest with the exception of defendants who are charged with the following:
 - Probation or parole violation
 - Fugitive from justice
 - Non-support of dependents
 - Charge that is a hold for another jurisdiction
 - Common Pleas capias if case previously arraigned

SCREENING PROCESS

- Summit County Pretrial Services staff assesses and evaluates potential clients for the program and makes a recommendation to the court.
- Once eligibility is determined, the court may release the defendant, as a condition of bond, to adhere to the rules and regulations of the Pretrial Supervision Program.
- Bond type and supervision level are determined by a validated risk assessment conducted by Pretrial Services. Defendants are placed in categories of minimum, medium and maximum supervision as court ordered. Special conditions of release may also be ordered.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Defendants are monitored by the Pretrial Supervision Program. Monitors track clients' compliance with reporting and conditions of release. All court dates are verified and documented and communicated to clients on a weekly basis.
- Reporting requirements and program placement are determined by the risk level.
 - Minimum – report once in person, then weekly by phone
 - Medium – report once in person, then every other week in person, alternate weeks by phone
 - Maximum – report weekly in person
- Special conditions of supervision ordered by the court may include, but are not limited to:
 - Referrals to treatment programs or other services
 - Random drug and alcohol testing
 - Electronic monitoring and residential placement
- No case management is provided to pretrial supervision clients other than to perform referral services

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- There are no programming costs to the client for pretrial supervision services with the exception of clients ordered to participate in electronic monitoring or residential placement.
- Clients are required to pay any bond amounts if ordered by the court.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- The defendant appears for court, the case is adjudicated, and the defendant did not have his/her bond revoked as it relates to pretrial supervision.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Failure to appear, a new arrest, or a technical violation may result in termination from the program.

PROGRAM GOALS

- To provide effective supervision and enhanced treatment services to misdemeanor offenders in an effort to change their chemical dependency behaviors and reduce the risk they pose to the safety of the community and to themselves.
- To assist participants in obtaining a sober and crime-free lifestyle.
- To reduce the stigma attached to a criminal conviction, for those eligible to have their charge dismissed upon completion.
- To provide immediate and appropriate substance abuse treatment.
- To facilitate behavioral change through the use of risk/needs assessments, referrals to appropriate community services and comprehensive case management services.

TARGET POPULATION (Intervention in Lieu of Conviction Track)

Akron Municipal Court defendants who:

- Meet the statutory requirements set forth in R.C. 2951.041;
- And express a willingness to participate in Recovery Court programming and engage in treatment.

TARGET POPULATION (Probation Track)

Akron Municipal Court defendants who:

- Are currently under the supervision of the Akron Municipal Court Probation Department;
- Are diagnosed with substance abuse or dependence;
- Are approved by the Probation Officer(s) and Recovery Court team;
- And express a willingness to participate in Recovery Court Programming and engage in treatment.

Disqualifying Legal Factors:

- Violent Felony convictions within the past five years, or has served a prison term within the past five years for a violent offense
- Active felony probation or parole supervision
- Prior convictions for Trafficking or Distribution of Drugs
- Registered Sex Offenders
- Prior successful completion of the Akron Recovery Court or the Summit County Drug Court/Turning Point Program within the past two years
- Prior successful completion of an Intervention in Lieu of Conviction Program
- For those offenders participating through the Intervention In Lieu of Conviction Track, prior drug treatment program
- Unsuccessful discharge from the Akron Recovery Court or Summit County Drug Court/Turning Point Programs

Disqualifying Clinical Factors:

- Highly resistant to changing behavior in spite of previous interventions and/or punishments
- Diagnosis of Developmental Disability if this disability prohibits the offender from complying with or comprehending chemical dependency treatment
- Co-occurring mental health or medical conditions if there is no adequate treatment available

Cases will be reviewed on an individual basis to determine the extent and circumstances surrounding the disqualification factors versus the need to participate in the program. Written and clinical eligibility criteria DO NOT create a right to participation. The Recovery Court Judge has the ultimate discretion on admission to the program.

SCREENING PROCESS (Intervention In Lieu of Conviction Track)

- At arraignment, a pretrial will be scheduled with the Recovery Court judge and defendants will be afforded counsel to make a formal request.
- The Recovery Court judge will then schedule a hearing, stay the proceedings.
- The defendant will be required to complete the prescreening and assessment process to determine eligibility under R.C. 2951.041.
- If eligible for admission the Recovery Court Judge will accept the plea following the eligibility hearing.

SCREENING PROCESS (Probation Track)

- At arraignment, offenders who appear to be eligible will be required to complete the prescreening and assessment process to determine eligibility for the program.
- If eligible, the offender will be afforded counsel at the time the guilty plea is entered.
- The Recovery Court Judge will accept the plea, enter the conviction and sentence the offender to the Recovery Court Program in lieu of incarceration.
- Other Akron Municipal Court Judges may transfer cases to Recovery court, both at the pre-plea and post plea stage of the proceedings.
- Offenders who are sentenced to community control or incarceration may also be referred from other Akron Municipal Court Judges to the Recovery Court.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- This program operates in conjunction with the Akron Municipal Court and the Akron Municipal Court Probation Department. The Recovery Court Judge provides regular judicial sessions for dispositions, progress reviews, rewards, and sanctions.
- Client program needs are determined through standard risk/needs assessment used to develop an individualized program plan.
- Substance Use assessments are conducted by a certified chemical dependency counselor who will recommend the most appropriate level of substance abuse treatment.
- Twelve-step program participation is encouraged.
- Case management sessions are held as determined by a client's compliance and individual needs.
- Random and routine urine drug screens and alcohol tests are required.
- In-house services may include:

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- Clients will be required to address financial obligations, including court costs, child support, license reinstatement fees, fines, restitution, and any outstanding fees owed to Oriana House.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Maintain compliance with all treatment, including attendance and participation, as outlined in the Individualized Treatment/Program Plan.
- Maintain sobriety for a minimum of 12 months for Intervention In Lieu of Conviction Track participants, 120 days for probation track participants.
- Maintain no criminal justice involvement for six months prior to completion.
- Attend all case management and status review appointments as required.
- Accomplish all ancillary goals as outlined in the Individualized Treatment/Program Plan.
- Comply with all rules of probation, including all community service hours and financial obligations as directed throughout the program and in the Individualized Treatment/Program Plan.
- Establish a written Relapse Prevention Plan/Life Plan.
- Attend commencement ceremony.
- For participants in the Intervention In Lieu of Conviction Track, successful completion will result in plea being vacated and dismissal of charges. Participants in this Track are eligible to apply to have their record sealed.
- Participants in the Probation Track are not eligible to have their charges dismissed.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Non-compliance with treatment plan and required programming.
- The Recovery Court Judge has the ultimate discretion on termination from the program.

PROGRAM GOALS

- To assist clients in achieving a sober and crime-free lifestyle.

TARGET POPULATION

- There are two offender populations served by the Turning Point Program.
 - **Track 1- Current Intervention In Lieu of Conviction (IILC) participants**
Current IILC participants in danger of being terminated can be referred to The Turning Point Program by the assigned Court. Participants are ordered to complete The Turning Point Program as a condition of IILC. After one year of sobriety, the case is dismissed.
 - **Track 2- Community Control Violators or defendants newly sentenced to Community Control**
As a condition of Community Control, probationers are ordered to complete The Turning Point Program. This is a post-conviction track with the goal of gaining a sober and law-abiding lifestyle.

SCREENING PROCESS

- The assigned court and/or supervising probation officer may refer cases to either Track.
- Prospective participants complete an application and a substance use assessment.
- Prospective participants undergo an interview to complete the Ohio Risk Assessment System (ORAS).
- After all three documents are completed; The Turning Point Program team reviews cases for eligibility.
- Participants are required to have intensive outpatient (IOP) as a minimum level of care for drug treatment and must have a moderate score or higher on the ORAS.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- This program operates in conjunction with the Summit County Court of Common Pleas. The Turning Point Program Judge provides weekly judicial sessions for dispositions, progress reviews, rewards and sanctions.
- Client program needs are determined through standard risk/needs assessments used to develop an Individualized Program Plan.
- Substance Use assessments are used to determine the most appropriate level of chemical dependency treatment. Compliance and successful completion of substance abuse treatment programming is required.
- Twelve-step program participation is encouraged and frequently required.
- Clients attend case management sessions throughout the 12 month-long program. The frequency of case management services is determined by a client's compliance and individual needs.
- Random and routine urine drug screens and alcohol tests are required.

- In-house services may include:
 - Case Management Services
 - Substance Use Assessment
 - Substance Abuse Treatment
 - Substance Abuse Aftercare/Post-Treatment
 - Crisis Intervention Counseling
 - Medication Assisted Treatment
 - Recovery Coaches
 - Cognitive Behavioral Programming
 - Family Education Programming
 - Anger Management Class
 - Employment Services
 - Trauma Treatment
 - Financial Management Class

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- Clients are responsible to pay a \$260 program fee and court costs prior to completion of the program. Indigent clients may apply for a fee reduction or waiver.
- The amount of court costs is determined by the Summit County Clerk of Court. Program fees are paid weekly, bi-weekly, or in monthly installments.
- Clients are required to address financial obligations, including court costs, child support, reinstatement fees, fines, restitution, and any outstanding fees owed to Oriana House.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Completion of Individualized Program Plan and Chemical Dependency Treatment Plan.
- Abstinence from drugs and alcohol for a minimum of 16 weeks prior to completion. Failure to abstain from drugs and alcohol for the last 120 days of the program will result in an extension of a client's program placement.
- Compliance with any sanction imposed.
- Track One clients will be returned to IILC to complete their court obligations and one year required sobriety. If successful, charge(s) will be dismissed upon successful program completion.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- New felony conviction will likely result in unsuccessful completion.
- Repeated noncompliance with individualized program plan and required programming or repeated noncompliance with program rules may result in an unsuccessful completion.
- Failure to report for scheduled case management services and court appearances for more than 30 consecutive days may result in unsuccessful completion.

- Adult felony offenders granted Judicial Release deemed in need of intense, continued services and supervision by the court.
- **Exclusions:**
 - The offender is actively working as a police informant;
 - The offender is a registered Tier III sex offender;
 - The offender is not a resident of Summit County or an adjoining county

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Weekly meetings with the Reentry Court team to discuss client progress and status.
- Weekly judicial sessions for intakes, dispositions, judicial rewards and sanctions.
- Client program needs are determined through the Ohio Risk Assessment System (ORAS) and background reports Individual Program Plan is based on client risks/needs.
- The program has four phases and lasts a minimum of 12 months:
 - Assessment/Orientation Phase
 - Program Engagement Phase
 - Growth and Development Phase
 - Maintenance Phase
- Frequent urine drug screens and alcohol tests.
- Graduated sanctions are imposed for failure to adhere to program requirements.
- In-house services may include, but are not limited to:

PROGRAM GOAL

- Family Intervention Program - To provide a specialized level of supervision and counseling services to adult offenders charged with domestic violence. Upon successful completion of the program, the case will be dismissed.
- Family Intervention Court - To provide a specialized level of supervision and counseling services to adult offenders convicted of domestic violence. This is the more intensive program of the two and is designed for repeat, higher risk offenders.

TARGET POPULATION

- Family Intervention Program - Adult offenders arrested for domestic violence, a misdemeanor of the first degree, who qualify for probation or other community placement.
- Family Intervention Court - Adult offenders convicted of domestic violence, a misdemeanor of the first degree, who qualify for probation or other community placement.

SCREENING PROCESS

- For FIP and FIC: Clients must be approved for participation in the program by the arresting police department, prosecutor's office, and victim.

FIP Exclusionary Criteria:

- No more than five contempt citations;
- No more than one non-violent felony conviction;
- No more than five nonviolent misdemeanor convictions in the past ten years;
- No prior assault of Domestic Violence convictions;
- No prior diversion placement, except for Akron Municipal Court DRP or the equivalent from another court;
- No active probation, community control or parole;
- No pending felony charge(s) or felony companion case;
- No pending violent misdemeanors;
- No companion resisting arrest charge or endangering children charge;
- Victim must be a family or household member and 18 years of age;
- No use of a firearm in the instant offense;
- Must be a United States citizen;
- No reasonable objection from the victim

FIC Exclusionary Criteria:

- Victim must be a family or household member and 18 years of age;
- More than two prior violent felony convictions, and/or more than four nonviolent felony convictions;
- No history of sexually oriented offenses;
- No more than five prior misdemeanor assault and/or domestic violence conviction within the past ten years;.
- Cannot have active felony probation, community control or parole;
- No pending nonrelated felony cases;
- No companion felony cases;
- No use of a firearm in the instant offense;

- No use of any weapon that resulted in an injury to the victim;
- Must be a United States citizen;
- No pending violent misdemeanor charges;
- No reasonable objection from the victim;
- Aggravated nature of the circumstances of the offense.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- This program operates in conjunction with the Akron Municipal Court and the Akron Probation Department. The Family Intervention Program/Family Intervention Court Judge provides regular judicial sessions for dispositions, judicial rewards, and sanctions.
- Client program needs are determined through a standard risk/needs assessment, substance abuse assessment and a specialized domestic violence screening tool.
- Coordination of services with the Battered Women's Shelter for victim advocacy issues, the Victim Assistance Program for the client's participation in violence cessation counseling, and Summit Psychological Association for client participation in the Time Out Diversion (FIP) and Conflict Solutions Program (FIC).
- Monthly program summaries are provided to the Probation Department.
- Random urine drug screens and alcohol tests are required.
- In-house services may include, but are not limited to:
 - Case Management
 - Substance Use Assessment
 - Substance Abuse Treatment
 - Substance Abuse Aftercare
 - Mental Health Counseling Referrals
 - Education Services
 - Employment Services
 - Cognitive Behavioral Programming
 - Family/Marital Counseling Referrals
 - Financial Education Classes
 - Recovery Coaches
 - Family Programming

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- Client will address financial obligations such as court costs (including any warrant fees), public defender fee, child support, program fees, counseling fees, restitution, and outstanding fees owed to Oriana House.
- Clients are required to pay a \$260 program fee. If the placement is extended beyond one year, there is an additional cost of \$5 per week until the program is completed.
- Clients are also required to pay counseling fees for Time Out Diversion (FIP) and Conflict Solutions Program (FIC).
- Fees are paid weekly, bi-weekly, or in monthly installments.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- FIP - Clients are successfully released when they have completed one year of the program, including six months of participation in the Time Out Diversion Program.
- Successful completion of the program results in the guilty plea being vacated and the charge dismissed.
- FIC - Clients are successfully released when they have completed one year of the program, including six weeks of participation in Thinking Errors Cognitive programming and six months of participation in the Conflict Solutions Program.
- Successful completion of the program results in release from Akron Municipal Court supervision.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- FIP and FIC - Failure to adhere to program requirements may result in graduated sanctions and the imposition of the previously held-in-abeyance sentence of 180 days.

SUMMIT COUNTY PRETRIAL DIVERSION PROGRAM

PROGRAM GOALS

- To provide an alternative to prosecution for first-time, non-violent, low-level felony offenders.
- To hold offenders accountable for their actions.
- To assist offenders in learning new ways to deal with the issues that led to their offense.
- To avoid the stigma of a criminal conviction.

TARGET POPULATION

- Adult first-time, non-violent, felony offenders amenable to counseling.

SCREENING PROCESS

- Defense attorney makes request for diversion through the Summit County Prosecutor's Office.
- Diversion counselor interviews the defendant to determine appropriateness for the program. If determined appropriate, diversion counselor contacts arresting officer and victim(s) to inquire if there are any objections to the defendant's participation in the program.
- Diversion counselor automatically recommends rejection of defendant's application if the arresting officer or victim(s) objects to diversion.
- Diversion counselor forwards reports and recommendation to the prosecutor who will make the final decision to either reject or accept the application for diversion.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Client participates in counseling with the diversion counselor as client's risks and needs warrant, ordinarily every two weeks.
- Client and the diversion counselor develop a treatment plan addressing issues and thinking leading to illegal behavior, as well as other risk/needs.
- Outside referrals may be utilized as well to meet risk/ needs.
- Restitution must be paid and is processed through the diversion counselor.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- \$20 screening fee.
- Client incurs a fee for service based on financial assessment utilizing Summit County ADM Board sliding fee scale for services.
- Restitution, if applicable.
- Court costs and court-appointed attorney fees as ordered by the court.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Clients are considered successfully released when they are in the program at least six months, but no longer than 18 months; when all treatment goals are met; and when all restitution and applicable court costs are paid.
- Successful release results in a recommendation to the judge that the pending charges be formally dismissed and the client's arrest record sealed.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Failure to follow through with treatment plan results in unsuccessful completion of the program.
- Failure to follow through with any referral may result in an unsuccessful completion of the program.
- A new conviction on a felony charge results in unsuccessful release from the program. Unsuccessful release is also possible on a new M1 or lower conviction.
- Unsuccessful release results in notification to the prosecutor's office. The prosecutor's office will schedule a sentencing date and the case will be returned to the court for further disposition.

PROGRAM GOAL

- To facilitate behavior changes for the criminal non-support offender to ensure the payment of current and future child support.

TARGET POPULATION

- Criminal non-support felony offenders who have violated other community control sanctions, have the ability to work, and otherwise may be incarcerated in the prison system.

SCREENING PROCESS

- *Prospective participants who are currently on probation:* the probation officer and prosecutor will make a recommendation to the judge that, as a result of a probation violation, the offender be sentenced to the Criminal Non-Support program. The offender must have a minimum of 545 days remaining on probation, will enter a guilty plea to the probation violation, and be sentenced to the Criminal Non-Support Program.
- *Prospective participants indicted with new nonsupport offense(s) and who have previous convictions of non-support* will, after their arraignment, be deemed eligible for the Criminal Non-Support Program based on the prosecutor's recommendation or recommendation of the court. The defendant will appear before the common pleas judge assigned to the case and enter a guilty plea to the new indictment. The judge will impose the sentence, place the defendant on probation for 18 months and require participation and completion of the Criminal Non-Support Program.
- **Exclusionary Criteria:**
 - Any client unable to work or participate in the program.

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Offenders are sentenced to the program for a maximum of 18 months.
- Each client will be assigned a caseworker for case management. Clients will have their program needs determined through a standard risk/needs assessment.
- An individual program plan (IPP) is developed and implemented.
- Clients must actively seek and maintain employment, and make child support payments as directed. Payment of child support is monitored.
- In-person reporting is required as often as five days per week.
- Summit County Adult Probation Department is notified within 24 hours or the next business day of significant program violations.
- Urine drug screens and alcohol tests are required.
- Clients who are not compliant with the nonresidential placement requirements will be subject to a continuum of sanctions, including increased reporting and supervision; placement on a behavioral contract; residential placement; and program termination.
- In-house services may include, but are not limited to:

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- Clients are charged \$5 per week or part thereof.
- Clients are required to address financial obligations including child support payments, court costs and/or fines, and any outstanding fees owed to Oriana House.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Compliance with reporting requirements and fulfillment of individual program plan requirements result in successful completion of the program. The offender must pay child support as ordered and attend appropriate programming as outlined in the individual program plan (IPP).

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Failure to adhere to reporting requirements, employment requirements, child support payment, and/or the individualized program plan or conviction of a new offense may result in unsuccessful program completion.

PROGRAM GOALS

- To provide transitional housing for offenders released from Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (ODRC) correctional facilities.
- To assist participant in reaching self-sufficiency and obtaining permanent housing thereby reducing the likelihood of continued criminal activity.

TARGET POPULATION

- Parolee, post release control, and transitional control offenders who are homeless.

SCREENING PROCESS

- Admission to the Community Residential Center (CRC) is based on risk level, not offense, and must comply with all local zoning ordinances.
- Parolee, post release control, and transitional control candidates assessed by the Ohio Risk Assessment System (ORAS) as low risk to reoffend are eligible for admission.
- Parolee, post release control, and transitional control candidates assessed by the ORAS as very high or high risk are eligible for admission to independent housing after successfully completing a community corrections residential program. A transfer to the CRC will be done in conjunction with the supervising authority.
- All Transitional Control offenders admitted to the CRC are subject to electronic monitoring through Oriana House.
- **EXCLUSIONARY CRITERIA:**
 - Tier 3 sex offenders
 - Arsonists on a case-by-case basis

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Provide temporary housing.
- Maintain a community resource guide.
- Assist clients in utilizing community resources to secure permanent housing, employment, and financial stability.
- Monitor client compliance to house rules and permanent housing deadlines.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- No cost to the client.

SUCCESSFUL COMPLETIONS

- Secures permanent housing approved by the Adult Parole Authority.

UNSUCCESSFUL RELEASES

- Failure to comply with house rules.
- New arrest.
- Failure to obtain permanent housing within ODRC specified timeframe.

PROGRAM GOALS

- To provide individuals with a safe and sober place to live while they embrace their recovery as they seek appropriate housing and employment.
- To assist individuals in developing skills to live a substance and crime free lifestyle in the community.
- To assist and direct individuals in selecting resources that will aid them in securing permanent housing, employment, and financial stability which will allow them the opportunity to make positive changes in their lives.
- To offer a wide variety of activities that supports a sober and productive lifestyle.

TARGET POPULATION

- Adults who are referred from Oriana House and other local treatment providers or from the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (ODRC).

SCREENING PROCESS

- Referral from accepted agency
- Negative drug and alcohol screening
- Intake interview to include understanding and agreement to Frederick Avenue Apartment rules and program requirements

DESCRIPTION OF SUPERVISION AND SERVICES

- Case monitoring, including referrals to community resources to address tenant's program needs.
- Regular and random drug and alcohol tests are administered to ensure a sober living environment.
- Recovery coaches individually assist clients in maintaining a positive and sober lifestyle and help them connect to the resources that they may need in the community.
- Tenants are required to adhere to curfews and limited visitation (all visitors need pre-approval) with no overnight visitors and no overnight stays away during the first month, and to attend mandatory weekly meetings.
- A staff person is in attendance, on-site, at all times, 24 hours a day.
- Tenants have access to activities that may include but are not limited to:
 - 12-Step Meetings (transportation provided)
 - Oriana House, Inc., Alumni Involvement
 - Exercise Classes
 - Education
 - Budgeting Classes
 - Morning and Evening Meditations
 - Life Skills Groups (various topics)
 - Transportation to Community Meetings/Events
 - Community Food Pantry
 - Parenting Classes
 - Cooking and Meal Preparation
 - Communication Skills
 - Employment Class
 - Stress Management Group
 - Discussion Groups (various topics)
 - Aftercare Treatment
 - Family Matters

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- Costs are initially paid through a contract with the Summit County Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services Board and ODRC. The per diem rate is then reduced as tenants find employment and start paying toward their own rent.

PURPOSE

- An innovative resource center that helps individuals who have been involved in the criminal justice system navigate the barriers to become law abiding citizens. It's difficult to come home from prison and be self-sufficient or find a job when you have a criminal record. North Star Neighborhood Reentry Resource Center (NRRC) is designed to provide information, a range of direct services, and convenient access to other community resources in a welcoming, supportive setting.

TARGET POPULATION

- Cuyahoga County residents who were formerly incarcerated in prison (and their family and friends).
- Cuyahoga County residents who are currently or were previously involved in the criminal justice system (and their family and friends).

DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES

- Internet access to appropriate websites and content.
- Computer training labs.
- Employment Services, such as job searching, interviewing techniques, résumé preparation, and the New Employment Transitions program.
- Referrals for free clothing.
- Assessments and referrals (if eligible) to the Ohio Benefit Bank for services such as food assistance (food stamp sign up), Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), student financial aid, health coverage, cash assistance, senior benefits, and benefits for children.
- GED classes.
- Self-help meetings such as AA, NA, Al-Anon, etc.
- Free, personal voice mail service.
- Vouchers for state IDs and birth certificates.
- Citizen Circles (groups of citizens involved in reentry services that meet with offenders and their families to help facilitate successful reentry).
- Faith-based programming.
- Public transportation information.
- Life Skills classes that teach tools for making good decisions, setting goals, building and maintaining mature relationships, managing money, and obtaining employment.
- Free healthcare clinics and screenings, including referrals to additional services at MetroHealth Broadway Health Center.
- Direct access to information, services, and staff from other community reentry service providers.
- Assistance with service referrals, resources, and follow-up on progress.
- Family Matters Education Program designed for family members and friends of those affected by addiction. Weekly sessions provide family members with encouragement, support, and increased knowledge to help break the cycle of substance abuse.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

- People interested in using North Star NRRC services receive a free membership which provides access at no cost to many services and reentry resources in the community.
- North Star NRRC is funded by the Cuyahoga County Office of Reentry as part of its initiative to provide focused leadership and strong organizational capacity to address prisoner reentry in the greater Cleveland area.
