Message to the community

We are pleased to provide a report of the work our agency did in 2006. As you would expect, this community report contains many numbers; however, as you review this information, please keep in mind that these statistics are more than numbers, they reflect lives.

By reading this report you will see that 12,659 people received rehabilitative services through our community corrections programs; 14,070 people were treated for chemical dependency issues; and 106 people slept in a warm bed every night rather than being homeless. For those of us who work daily with or for these people, those numbers have an astounding impact. We believe that our clients are going home to be better husbands, wives, fathers, mothers, sons, daughters, and neighbors. They are improving their lives and becoming better people.

Oriana House has been providing these services for 25 years. We began in 1981 in Summit County and have expanded our services to facilities in Seneca and Cuyahoga counties. Throughout these years, I have had the privilege of working with some of the finest people in the criminal justice system and with community leaders who are truly committed to their community. Our staff of more than 500 takes great pride in the services we provide and are committed to providing these services for many more years to come.

25th Anniversary

Oriana House celebrated its 25th anniversary with a staff appreciation luncheon. We are fortunate to have exemplary staff who are dedicated to our mission. Our work is demanding and it is our staff's commitment to our clients and our programs that results in changed lives.

NEW HALFWAY HOUSE PROGRAM

In March 2006, Oriana House opened the Glenwood Halfway House, a 36-bed facility for Restricted Halfway House clients. These clients are sentenced by the municipal and common pleas courts to the program for a maximum

of 60 days, during which they are not allowed to leave the facility for any reason, except for medical appointments. Clients participate in intense services including assessments, chemical dependency treatment, cognitive skills programming, and education and employment classes.

REENTRY INITIATIVES

Oriana House is on the forefront of the reentry initiatives taking place in Ohio. Reentry initiatives address the barriers offenders have to overcome in transitioning from an institution to their community, focusing on areas to reduce

recidivism. Staff have taken leadership responsibilities with community forums in Cleveland and Akron and are working at all levels, from grass-roots all the way to legislative action, to find and implement resources that help offenders become and remain productive members of their communities.

LEADERSHIP

In 2006, Oriana House executives led three of Ohio's corrections associations: the Ohio Correctional and Court Services Association (OCCSA), the Ohio Community Corrections Association (OCCA), and the Ohio Justice Alliance

for Community Corrections (OJACC). While each of these associations plays a unique role, together they are the primary avenue for community corrections agencies, officials, and advocates across Ohio to come together, learn, and impact policy. It was rewarding to have the experience and expertise of Oriana House staff recognized throughout Ohio.

WHAT WORKS

This was the second year of incorporating the evidence-based What Works cognitive behavioral initiative into Oriana House programming.

What Works focuses on changing clients' behaviors by changing the way clients think, thus allowing them to become prosocial members of the community.

ACA ACCREDITATION

The Summit County community based correctional facilities (CBCFs) and the CROSSWAEH CBCF in Seneca County each received a score of 100% on their American Correctional Association (ACA) reaccreditations in 2006. Only one-half of one-percent of all ACA audits results in a perfect score. ACA standards address services, programs, and operations essential

to effective correctional management. Oriana House has nine programs/facilities that are ACA accredited.

HALFWAY HOUSE WINS AWARD

The Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction's 2006 Cliff Skeen Award was awarded to Oriana House's halfway house program, which includes three facilities in Akron and one in Cleveland. This award recognizes exemplary efforts in providing quality programming. Oriana House was selected out of 26 agencies that offer halfway house programs in Ohio.


